Pacem in Terris at 60: Is the Catholic Church Heeding the Call to Gospel Nonviolence?

A recent article in the *National Catholic Reporter* featured the Pax Christi meeting on April 19th in Chicago at the Catholic Theological Union (CTU) in honor of the 60th Anniversary of *Pacem in Terris*. The Society of Mary U.S. Province sponsored the conference with a donation through the generosity of the U.S. Provincial and the Provincial Council. Fr. Ted Keating, SM a member of the International Funding Committee of Pax Christi, participated in organizing the meeting given his close relationship with CTU. The conference can be viewed HERE.

Pacem in Terris, John XXIII's Encyclical of 1963, was written in the shadow of the Cuban Missile Crisis. It was the first time that a Pope wrote an Encyclical to "All men(sic) of Good Will" rather than only to the Church itself. It clearly opened the door to the great social documents of Vatican II. This conference focused its celebration on what appears to be a gradual, if slow, move in the Papacy to a preference toward Gospel non-violence throughout the Church's social concerns about war and peace. 171. Let us, then, pray with all fervor for this peace which our divine Redeemer came to bring us. May He banish from the souls of all people whatever might endanger peace. May He transform all of us into witnesses of truth, justice and brotherly/sisterly love. May He illumine with His light the minds of rulers, so that, besides caring for the proper material welfare of their peoples, they may also guarantee them the fairest gift of peace.

Finally, may Christ inflame the desires of all to break through the barriers which divide them, to strengthen the bonds of mutual love, to learn to understand one another, and to pardon those who have done them wrong. Through His power and inspiration may all peoples welcome each other to their hearts as brothers or sisters, and may the peace they long for ever flower and ever reign among them.



Inaugural voyage of the Dorothy Day Staten Island Ferry

On April 28th, New York City officially commissioned the newest member of the Staten Island Ferry fleet - the Dorothy Day.

The \$85 million state-of-the-art ferry is named for Dorothy Day, the activist and journalist with ties to the Lower East Side, where she worked with the poor and founded The Catholic Worker newspaper. "During her life, (Dorothy) Day loved riding this ferry. She knew how a short ride can serve as a peaceful escape from the hustle and bustle of the City. Best of all, given her commitment to equity, Day would be thrilled at how DOT is committed to keeping this ferry free." -Commisioner Rodriguez



The Society of Mary played an influential role in Dorothy Day's faith formation. While living in her cottage on Staten Island in the 1920s, Day worked for a few months in the kitchen at Our Lady of the Elms, the Marists' novitiate and Rev. James McKenna, SM, served as her spiritual director. Although she worked for the Marists for a relatively brief time, she later said in a Marist Profession ceremony in 1968, where she was a guest speaker, "I am very much a member of the family with the Marists and I am very happy that they consider me as a member of their family."




New Novice for Marist Sisters
