During the first full week of August Marist School welcomed faculty and staff back to campus for "Mission Launch", an invigorating day centered on the Marist Way pillars of Prayer, Service, and Community. The employees participated in various prayer practices across campus, including music, art, writing, and meditation. They also assembled 1,200 food bags for Mercy Care. Throughout the day, groups participated in the Adult Big Wheel Club team-building event, which energized their community spirit.

Principal Kevin Mullally, in his opening address, shared insights from the recent Marist summer pilgrimage when he visited La Neylière, the site where Fr. Colin is buried and where he wrote much of the Society of Mary's Constitutions. Mr. Mullally highlighted a powerful metaphor of the Marist mission as a ship guided by Mary. Bishop Joel Konzen, S.M.'s homily during Mass at La Neylière emphasized the laity's role in continuing Mary's work and advancing the mission: "Let us rejoice to be in the ship with Mary at the helm. And let us not be afraid to think, judge, feel, and act as she would."











During the opening of the 2024-25 school year, the Peer Leaders engaged with new students during each grade's orientation, offering warmth and support to build a strong sense of belonging from the start. Each Peer Leader is paired with two or three new students, reflecting the school's commitment to hospitality and community.











On August 15th, Marist School celebrated the Mass of the Assumption, the first school-wide Mass of the academic year and the feast day of the school's patroness. They prayed for the student Retreat Leaders, chosen for their demonstrated leadership and faith, who will lead their peers on spiritually enriching retreats this school year. School Chaplain Fr. John Ulrich, S.M., shared this reminder during his homily: "Our school crest, and the crest of the Society of Mary, reminds us that we are 'Sub Mariae Nomine'—under the name of Mary. We bear her name as Marists and are sheltered under that name. Do you know what is the greatest desire of Mary, our spiritual mother? It is that we live good lives, worthy of our dignity as men and women created in the image of God. Mary wants nothing more than for us to live good, holy lives."



Marist School students enjoyed the Activities Fair on August 23rd. Marist School's commitment to educating the whole person is reflected in the wide breadth of extracurricular activities offered, designed to ignite passions and unlock the God-given greatness within every student. All over campus—from on stage to the robotics ring, in the art studio, and beyond—Marist students explore their interests and develop their strengths and talents. With 88 student clubs and activities, 100% of the students participate in at least one extracurricular activity during their time at Marist.









Marist School's Generations families gathered for a lively tailgate on August 23rd. Hosted by the Marist Alumni Office, the Generations Welcome Back Tailgate annually celebrates alumni who are current Marist parents or grandparents. This event is both a joyful reunion and a warm "welcome back" to new legacy families, marking the start of the school year with enthusiasm and the promise of creating new Marist memories.



Marist School sponsored an 8-day pilgrimage to Marist places in France. There were 25 participants with Marists Bishop Mgr. Joel Konzen and Fr. John Harhager acting as chaplains, along with a diocesan friend of Bishop Konzen. Sr. Terri O'Brien, sm provided her enthusiastic expertise to the trip – helping make it a Marist Family event. The participants were staff members including the president and principal of the school, alumni and parents of alumni. Most of the Marist sites were visited including Fourvière, Le Puy, St. Bonnet-le-Troncy & Coutouvre, Cerdon, Belley, La Neylière, and L'Hermitage.

Synodality Corner...

The Synod on Synodality is a three-year process of listening and dialogue that began in 2021. The first session of the Synod in Rome concluded at the end of October 2023.

Until the next session begins, let's remember some highlights of this first Synod session from Pope Francis.

"Pope Francis cautions that there are risks in the synodal process that we must avoid if our communication is to be effective. The first is formalism, which he describes as admiring the magnificent façade of a church without ever actually stepping inside. We have to set aside worries about how we might appear to others and take a courageous look into our own hearts. This process may reveal unpleasant and painful truths, but it is a necessary part of growing as the body of Christ."
