The Marists Constitutions say, "The spiritual life is nourished by contemplation of the Word of God. This heightens awareness of the presence of the risen Jesus in the everyday life and work of Marists. His presence inspires them to make of their lives and unceasing prayer." (*Constitutions*, 118).

The Marists encourage us to explore glimpses of our spirituality this Advent in silent contemplation because in order for us "to form a communion for mission, we need to deepen the contemplative dimension of our lives.
