On November 1st, the Marist School community gathered for Mass to celebrate All Saints' Day. School Chaplain Fr. John Ulrich, SM delivered a homily reminding everyone of the shared call to sainthood. "Saints are women and men who accept God's free gift of salvation," he said. "Saints do not reject the world; they embrace it and make it better. There are saints right here among us at Marist." Fr. Ulrich acknowledged the faculty and staff for their dedication to guiding each other and our students with holiness. He also highlighted the ways our students show saintly qualities - offering companionship, helping peers even when it's inconvenient, and demonstrating goodness in countless ways. He encouraged everyone to recognize and affirm these acts of kindness in one another.

In anticipation of All Souls' Day, the school community also remembered beloved members of the Marist family who have passed away. Fr. Ulrich offered a special blessing over the names inscribed in the Book of Remembrance, which will remain in various locations on campus throughout November.









Twenty-three Marist School seniors were recently recognized by the College Board National African American and National Hispanic Recognition Programs for their exceptional academic achievements. These programs, aimed at breaking down barriers to higher education, connect talented students with opportunities at leading universities and scholarship programs. To qualify, students must be in the top 10% of PSAT scores in Georgia or score three or higher on two or more AP exams by their junior year.







In preparation for the 2024 election, Marist School students explored the exhibit "Framing the Presidency" in Marist's Goizueta Center for Immersive Experience and Design. This immersive experience, a collaborative creation led by Marist's Global & Humane Studies Director Mrs. Kelly Mandy '96, with inspiration from Mrs. Jillian Bauersfeld, offered students a dynamic look at themes and communication strategies used by U.S. Presidential candidates over the past 50 years. Students in classes such as upper-level social studies, government, American experiment, marketing, and world religion gained historical context for how campaigns from the 1976, 1984, 1992, and 2008 elections shaped voter perceptions through the evolving media landscape. The exhibit included themed "campaign tunnels" for each election year, meticulously designed to reflect media technology of the time, from newspapers and projectors to laptops. Special thanks to Fr. Frank Kissel, S.M., Mrs. Bauersfeld, Ms. Anna Lee Lanning, Ms. Angela Williams, and the social studies department for their support in bringing this experience to life. Marist students are encouraged to approach civic participation thoughtfully, seeking dialogue and respect as they prepare to vote and engage in the political process for years to come.




