




On All Souls' Day—and throughout the month of November—ND Academy joins the Church in praying for the souls of the faithful departed, especially those we have known and loved.



Pastor Ron brought a newly created plaque commemorating the founding of his church and asked that it be displayed in the new chapel NDP is planning for the building.

NDP Head of School Andy Guest and Corporate President Fr. Leon Olszamowski, s.m., gratefully accepted the plaque, expressing that it would be a privilege to honor the church's legacy in its new chapter. Notre Dame Prep has formally requested permission from Archbishop Edward Weisenburger of the Archdiocese of Detroit to convert the former Baptist church into a Catholic chapel, which will be named the Holy Name of Mary Chapel. The school is planning to hold middle school confessions there in the coming weeks.

President Lalabalavu Visits Marist General House in Rome

The President of the Republic of Fiji, His Excellency Ratu Naiqama Lalabalavu, was welcomed at the General House in Rome on October 28th, where he, accompanied by the First Lady attended a Mass and Veiqaravi Vakavanua hosted by the Marist Family in honor of his official visit to the Holy See.

The event brought together a group from across the Pacific who serve within the Marist community in Rome and the Vatican. They were joined by Italian religious members, friends of the Pacific, and Pacific Islanders employed at the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) headquarters in Rome.

President Lalabalavu was received on arrival by Fr. Setefano Mataele, SM, who extended a warm welcome on behalf of the newly appointed Superior General of the Marists, Very Reverand Declan Marmion. Fr. Marmion, who recently assumed global leadership of the Marist Society, conveyed his greetings and prayers to the Fijian delegation, as he was unable to be present.

The Mass was celebrated by Fr. Mika Tuilau, SM, with the homily delivered by Fr. John of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart. His Excellency received a special blessing from the four main congregants.

The Mass was celebrated by the Marist priests. Attendees included members of the Marist Family representing Fiji, Tonga, Samoa, Papua New Guinea, the Solomon Islands, and Bougainville.

In his remarks, President Lalabalavu expressed heartfelt appreciation to the Marist Family for their enduring role in shaping Fiji's education, faith, and moral formation. He noted that the Marist mission has long served as a cornerstone of Fiji's nation-building and continues to inspire values of discipline, compassion, and service.


President Lalalbalavu also highlighted the importance of moral and faith-based leadership in addressing contemporary social challenges, including the fight against drug abuse, reaffirming Fiji's vision for a drug-free and peaceful Pacific.

The Marist General House, which this year marks its 100th anniversary, holds deep historical significance. It was originally entrusted to the Marists in the 1920s, briefly occupied during the Second World War, and later restored to the congregation in the 1950s. Today's occasion was of special significance, as President Lalabalavu became the first sitting Head of State to visit the Marist General House—an honor that coincides with the centennial year of this historic building. The visit concluded with a traditional welcome ceremony, Talanoa, and dinner, where the President, the First Lady, and the delegation shared fellowship with the Marist community, Pacific clergy, and members of the Pacific diaspora serving in Rome.






Marist Laity NZ - November Reflection: Fr. Colin: A friend and guide
